Graduation Initiative

- Guiding Principles:
 - Guide students into the right major early
 - Avoid late attrition from majors
 - Monitor student progress toward timely degree completion
 - Mitigate barriers to student persistence and graduation
 - Enable greater student self-guidance and accountability
 - Ensure faculty oversight of curriculum

Graduation Initiative

- Components:
 - Auditable Degree Analysis
 - Acalog/Curriculog
 - Degree Audit
 - Unnecessary Barriers Analysis
 - Degree Maps
 - Student Success Collaborative "Success Markers"
 - Advising Campaigns

Auditable Degree Analysis: Acalog/Curriculog

Goals:

- Maintain accurate and clear account of all course offerings and degree program requirements/options
- 2. Allow faculty, departments, colleges, and staff to access, edit, and propose changes to the curriculum and catalog in a web-based approval system
- Integrate course and curriculum information with Banner to create a single, authoritative source
- 4. Enable implementation of a reliable, clear, degree audit

Acalog/Curriculog: Academic Advisory Team

 Advise during conceptualization and development, serve as primary contact

Auditable Degree Analysis: Degree Audit

- Integrate course, degree, and catalog information with Banner and degree audit system to ensure accuracy and timely changes
- Following Acalog implementation, degree programs will be examined for their ability to utilize the tools for degree planning and audit

Unnecessary Barriers Analysis

- What elements are student responsibility?
 - Can students easily determine:
 - 1. the criteria for admission and continued enrollment in a major?
 - 2. courses required in the major that are linked to prerequisite courses/sequences?
- Where do institutional needs exist?
 - Can the institution readily determine:
 - If sufficient sections are offered?
 - Where resources are needed?

Degree Maps

- Encourage students to stay on track toward timely graduation
- Provide definitive measures of whether, and to what degree, student are off track
- Enable interventions ("advising campaigns") to get students back on track or into alternate major
- Monitoring of Degree Map progress now possible using SSC 'success markers'
